The Emma L. Bowen Foundation was created in 1989 to prepare minority youth for careers in the media industry. The Foundation's program is unlike traditional intern programs in that students work for partner companies during summers and school breaks from the summer following their junior year in high school until they graduate from college.

During the five-year program, students have an opportunity to learn many aspects of corporate operations and develop company-specific skills.

Corporations have an opportunity to train and mentor students with the option of fulltime employment upon completion of their college degrees.

Students earn an hourly salary and matching funds for college expenses. An annual student conference, a community service program and a mentoring program are also provided to further enhance the student's knowledge and experience.

Resource guides for both students and corporate supervisors are provided to maximize the student's experience while in the program.

This unique, multi-year program prepares a diverse group of talented young professionals to enter the workforce with specific job-related skills, knowledge of the corporate environment and a strong foundation for future advancement. Currently, we have more than 220 active students nationwide and an equal number of graduates. Approximately 60-70 new students join the program each year.

The National Bar Association Crump LawCamp was established by the National Bar Association to provide students entering the ninth through eleventh grades (between the ages of 14 and 17) with an introduction to the American judicial system. The campers descended upon the campus of Howard University where they were introduced to law school and learned some of the skills required to be an effective lawyer. The campers are paired with college and law students, professors, and practicing attorneys to serve as mentors as they continue through high school, college and law school. The camp provides students with an exciting academic and social agenda, which includes field trips in the Washington, DC area. The competitive highlight of the camp is the Evett L. Simmons Mock Trial

Competition. The four winners of this competition are invited to the NBA's Annual Convention. The most telling compliment from

campers is the request to return for another summer .

Goal of The Camp

More than 90 percent of this nation's lawyers are white, as are more than 80 percent of the students enrolled in law school. Yet, more than 30 percent of the United States is comprised of people of color. Projections are that by the year 2050, more than half of the people of this country will be of color. It is imperative that we begin now to direct students, while they are young, to seek careers in legal profession. Thus, there is need on the part of bar associations of color to "grow attorneys."
If America is to become a true country of inclusion, the legal system must lead the way. This can be done only when diverse groups of people bring their culture, ethnic, and social backgrounds into the equation.

The Faculty and Staff

The faculty for the camp includes members of the National Bar's Law Professors Division and visiting guest lecturers. The Law Professors Division consists of professors and deans of several U.S. law schools, who are experienced, professional legal educators and clinical supervisors. The National Bar Association's Law Students Division

members, college students, will act as teaching assistants and student monitors.

The program has one full-time executive director with experience in the creation, operation, and marketing of youth camps.

Part-time administrative staff assists the executive director.

Selection of Campers and Tuition

Participants must be between 14 and 17 year of age, entering the 9th and through 11th grade. Campers will be housed on the campus of Howard University and live in a protected campus environment.

The Camp will have an open enrollment policy and be available to students from across the country; however, emphasis will be on enabling low-income students of color. Campers are selected by the Crump Law Committee.

Tuition for the Camp will vary depending upon family income and number of dependents in the family. (See Tuition Fee Schedule on Application) The tuition covers transportation to and from Washington, DC; housing; meals; educational materials; and expenses for field trips.

However, students who are required to pay full tuition must also pay for their transportation to and from Washington, DC.

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
