Project Uplift 2007

Dear Colleague:

Greetings from Carolina! I am delighted to inform you that **Project Uplift 2007** is now underway. This special program, which enables historically underrepresented students to experience college life firsthand, is now in its 40th year.

Through *Project Uplift*, Native American, African American, Hispanic/Latino, Asian American, and students from other historically underrepresented populations have an opportunity to spend two days on campus learning about admissions procedures and academic opportunities at the University. This year's program will be held on **May 24-26, May 31-June 2, June 7-9, and June 14-16**. There is a nonrefundable \$5 registration fee; beyond that, *Project Uplift* is an all expense paid program, including meals, room, and program materials. **We are not able to provide transportation.**

Each year, we invite high school counselors to identify high-achieving students whose attendance would contribute to the diversity of Carolina's undergraduate population. As one of our Access partners with ties to students in the community, we'd greatly appreciate your help in making *Project Uplift* a success. If you know of any students who meet the criteria listed below, please inform them of *Project Uplift* and encourage them to discuss their nomination with their high school counselors or submit their information on the attached nomination form.

Selected students are asked to register for *Project Uplift* online, where they will select a date to attend. Students will also be required to return (via US mail) a signed permission form from their parents and a non-refundable \$5 registration fee. Please encourage students to be mindful of final exam schedules, SAT/ACT dates, graduation dates, and other commitments that might affect their ability to attend

To ensure the ongoing success of *Project Uplift*, we rely on educators like you to nominate rising seniors who are academically sound and who meet several important academic criteria:

- Enrolled or will be enrolled in a college preparatory curriculum, including at least one AP course, one year of foreign language, and mathematics through Geometry or Algebra II.
- Ranked in the top 25% of their class, with demonstrated potential in a competitive environment.

- Actively involved in extracurricular and leadership activities.

We will also welcome high achievers who:

- Have strong academic potential, yet may not have above average standardized exam scores.
- Come from disadvantaged backgrounds and feel they cannot afford a Carolina education..

University Summer Journalism Program Scholarship:

A 10-day all-expenses-paid summer journalism program will be held in August at Princeton University for students from under resourced financial backgrounds.

All application materials are available at www.princeton.edu/~sjp.

All expenses, including travel costs to and from Princeton, will be paid for. This will be the sixth year of the program, and if this summer is anything like the last five, it will be a great experience. Our last five classes of journalists were taught by writers from The Washington Post, The Philadelphia Inquirer, The Miami Herald, and The New Republic; toured The New York Times and ABC News, meeting with editors and producers; attended and covered Yankees, Mets, Jets and Liberty games; and reported, wrote, edited, designed, and produced a 12-page edition of The Princeton Summer Journal on the program's final day.

The program is also designed to give students a taste of what life is like at one of the best colleges in the country. Students live on campus and eat in one of the university's cafeterias. Students meet with the Princeton University's president and the school's dean of admissions—people who are able to offer guidance on the difficult decisions about college that high school students face. The program is staffed by young alumni of Princeton, current Princeton students, and students who attended the program in past summers.

To apply for the program, you must meet the following qualifications:

- 1) You must be entering your junior or senior year of high school in fall 2007.
- 2) You must have at least a 3.0 grade point average (out of 4.0).
- 3) You must have demonstrated an interest in journalism.
- 4) The combined income of your custodial parent(s) / guardian plus child support payments, if any, must not exceed \$45,000.

This program is intended for students from under resourced financial backgrounds. If the combined income of your custodial parent(s)/guardian(s) plus child support payments, if any, exceeds \$45,000 and you still wish to apply, you can attach a note explaining why you believe your family qualifies as financially under resourced.
